

Grammar Points

When entering a restaurant in Hong Kong, someone will most likely ask you "How many people?" (幾多位? - gei2 do1 wai2) The first part of this sentence is made up of the word for "how many," which in Cantonese is 幾多 (gei2 do1). The measure word for "people" is 位 (wai2) and literally means "seat."

You can simply respond to this question by replacing 幾多 with a number followed by the measure word for "people" (位).

The numbers 1-5 in Cantonese are:
