

Grammar Points

A parting greeting suitable for any occasion is 再見 (zoi3 gin3), which literally means "again see." Both of the syllables zoi3 and gin3 are mid, flat tones. This parting greeting is also perfect for occasions that are more formal. You can make this less formal by using 再見喇 (zoi3 gin3 laa6), which is commonly used between close friends. Cantonese has also taken a loanword from English, and it is not uncommon to hear 拜拜 (baai1 baai3) being used instead of 再見, especially among the younger generation.

Finally, a casual way of saying "See you later" is 遲啲見 (ci4 di1 gin3). The direct translation is "Later see." 遲 (ci4) is the lowest tone and means "later," while 啲 is the Cantonese version of "-er" in English. 見 (gin3) is the verb "to see."

Cultural Insight

Quick Tip: 1

Many native Hong Kongers have completely adopted the English word "Good-bye" pronouncing it 拜拜 (baai1 baai3).

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
