

# 'Have' and 'Have Got'

Hello and welcome back, in this lesson we will be looking at how to use the word 'have' by itself and with 'got'.



## Have

The word have is used to express ownership.  
Such as to possess, own, hold for, use and contain.

### Examples

I have an apple



She has brown hair



It has four legs.



## Have got

Have got is used in some English-speaking countries to mean *have, possess*.

*John has got a big house.*



*We haven't got any children*



*Have you got the time, please?*



Remember to use *has* in the third person.

**Table:**

<b>Positive</b>	<b>Negative</b>	<b>Question</b>
I've got	I haven't got	Have I got?
You've got	You haven't got	Have you got?
He's got	He hasn't got	Has he got?
She's got	She hasn't got	Has she got?
It's got	It hasn't got	Has it got?
We've got	We haven't got	Have we got?
You've got	You haven't got	Have you got?
They've got	They haven't got	Have they got?



## More Examples:

*This hotel has got many rooms.*



*This television hasn't got an off switch!*



*I've got a terrible headache!*



*We haven't got time to look in shop windows. Come on!!*



*Has your car got electric windows?*



*Have your parents got photos of their wedding?*



**Note.** You cannot use **have got** to replace **have** in expressions which do not signify **possession**.

*I have a shower at seven every morning.* ✓

**NOT** *I have got a shower at seven every morning.* ✗
